
Voiced and Unvoiced Consonant Digraph th

Digraphs are two letters that make one sound. Consonant digraphs make new sounds. (**th**at-vs hat, ba**th**-vs bat) The consonant digraph th can be unvoiced (<u>th</u>)or voiced (**th**). (**th**eir <u>th</u>umb, **th**at ba<u>th</u>, **th**is ma<u>th</u>) Wi<u>th</u> a hand on **th**e <u>th</u>roat, feel if **th**ere is a vibration or not. (Remember that all vowels are voiced)

UNVOICED TH is made with a push of air, no vibration.



VOICED TH is made with vibration, it can be felt with a hand on the throat and feels like a buzz on the lips.



Read the following sentences and notice the difference.
